#### Covid-19: Shoprite Reveals Plan to Leave Nigeria, Nigeria Struggles With Dwindling Economy

Owing to the negative effects of the coronavirus pandemic, the nation's economy has continued to dwindle. Predictions by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) indicate the diminution of Nigeria's economy by 3.4%. Reacting to the economic downturn, one of the leading ratail chain stores, Shoprite, has announced plans to divest in the business saying that "an outright sale of its operation or selling a majority stake in its Nigerian subsidiary is in the offing. Similarly, the International Energy Agency (IEA) has predicted a decline in the global demand for crude oil following travel restrictions. So far, the slump in oil prices has led to a plunge in the collective revenue of major oil and gas companies including Seplat Petroleum Development Company (SEPLAT) and Total Nigeria. Despite the uncertainty of the full economic impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, some companies remain optimistic that the market will improve. On another note, the aviation sector has witnessed dwindling revenues due to travel restrictions, which have further eroded the viability of local airlines. Most flight operators have introduced revival strategies as the federal government has allegedly withdrawn it's earlier pledge of N27bn bailout to enhance their financial stability. Recent reports have indicated cuts in jobs and salaries, as well as sale of assets by the operators. However, officials of the Ministry of Aviation have denied knowledge of any bailout for the aviation sector as widely reported in the media. Wole Oyebade, Guardian News (3rd August) explains.

Still on the economy, some analysts have forecast that Nigeria's unemployment rate could further rise to 33.6% (or 33.4 million people) by the end of the year unless urgent steps are taken to address further decline of the economy. In a recent household survey released by the National Bureau of Statistics, it is estimated that over 40% of Nigerian households could be classified as poor, and that the economy could shrink between 4.40% and 8.91%. ## Outrage over Sovereignty Clause in China-Nigeria Loan Agreement

The demand by the Minister of Transportation, Rotimi Amaechi, asking the House of Representatives to suspend the probe of the \$500m loan from China's Export-Import Bank, has caused uproar in the media. The House Committee on Treaties, Protocols, and Agreements, while conducting a probe on loans and agreements between Nigeria and China had made fresh discovery of what it considered as "controversial sovereignty clause" in the agreements. Defending the agreement, Amaechi explained, that Nigeria is not waving its sovereignty but that the "sovereignty clause" citied in the agreement is an assurance that the loan will be repaid. Criticising the loan agreement, former Vice President, Atiku Abubarkar, has demanded that President Muhammdu Buhari apologizes to Nigerians. Reacting to this, the All Progressives Congress (APC) has asked the past Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) led government, to account for the failed \$460m Abuja Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) project, and the \$2bn China Ioan. <u>Daily Sun (4<sup>th</sup> August)</u> writes

Meanwhile, the Debt Management Office (DMO) has clarified that China is not the major source of funding for the country. Bassey Udo, <u>Premium</u> <u>Times (6<sup>th</sup> August)</u> explains. # APC to Introduce Data Bank for Members, Urges Ex-Party Members to Return, as Edo Political Crisis Deepens

The APC has initiated a common data bank for its members to enhance easy administration, unite members and foster reconciliation in the party. This was disclosed by a member of the APC National Caretaker Committee, Senator Abba Ali. He further said that the committee is committed to using the reconciliatory process to achieve desired goals. Vanguard News (4th August) details. As part of the APC's reconciliatory moves, the party has asked former members who defected from the party to return. It extended the gesture to former APC members who have joint the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) including former Vice President, Atiku Abubakar, Ex-Senate President, Bukola Saraki, and the Sokoto State Governor, Aminu Tambuwal. The APC restated the efforts by Governor Mai Mala Buni-led caretaker committee to reposition the party and reconcile aggrieved members. Adamu Abuh, Guardian News (3<sup>rd</sup> August) details.

Meanwhile, the deputy governor of Edo State, Philip Shaibu, has accused the deputy speaker of the State House of Assembly, Yekini Idiaye, of collecting N40m from the former National Chairman of the APC, Adams Oshiomhole, to support the APC candidate in the September 19 governorship election, Osagie Ize-Iyamu. Peter David writes in <u>Punch News (5<sup>th</sup> August)</u>. On another note, the APC has accused the PDP of "criminally converting the Edo State treasury to a political slush fund". Responding to this, the PDP described such allegation as an "unnecessary cry of a drowning party". Chuks Okocha and Adedayo Akinwale detail in <u>This Day News (3<sup>rd</sup> August)</u>.

Writing on the situation of the APC in Edo State ahead elections and at the national level, an article by Tofe Ayeni of <u>The Africa Report (5<sup>th</sup> August)</u>, points to the growing need of the APC to secure victory at all levels. According to the article, "the election for the governorship of Edo State, due on September 19, is a weathervane for Nigeria's politics". In this regard, the article refers to the influence of regional politics in Nigeria's federal system, saying that any serious contender in the 2023 national elections will need to have strongholds across the country.

Meanwhile, armed personnel of the Nigeria Police Force took over the premises of the Edo State House of Assembly. The incident is believed to be connected with speculations that APC members of the House, who are loyal to Oshiomhole, have perfected plans to sit at the Assembly Complex and elect a new Speaker and to impeach Obaseki. The removal of the Speaker, Francis Okiye, though controversial, was eventually carried out and a new Speaker, Victor Edoror was elected as replacement. # IOM Provides New Facility for Victims of Human Trafficking, as House of Reps Calls for Collaboration Against Human Trafficking

The International Organisation for Migration (IOM) has opened a new facility in Edo State to provide uninterrupted access to legal services for victims of trafficking in Nigeria. According to a statement released on its website, the facility will provide free, timely, and confidential legal aid to victims without restriction. Meanwhile, the House of Representatives has called for collaboration from all levels of government, wives of state governors, and other relevant stakeholders to enhance Nigeria's fight against human trafficking. On another note, the National Agency for the Prohibition of Trafficking in Persons (NAPTIP) has said that it has increased the sensitization of citizens on the dangers of human trafficking. #### "Revolution Now" Protests Rock Abuja, Lagos, Others

Some protesters under the aegis of "Revolution Now" have embarked on protests in various locations across the country, demanding good governance, infrastructural development, an end to extra-judicial killings, sack of service chiefs, among others.
