

Development of German Army Tasks





Phases of Missions - ISAF


Key Facts (Learning perspective) - Timelines

 Beginning in the KABUL area ISAF – mindset initially SFOR/KFOR influenced "Safe and Secure Environment" (SASE) concept to ensure freedom of movement Tactics "wave and smile" "Hit & Run" attacks by INS 	2002	
 Lead Nation RC N DEU took over lead in RC N & first NATO OMLT in KUNDUZ IED threat due to deterioration of security situation Equipment for long term patrols required 	2006	
Increased intensity ➤ Passive peace keeping mission turned into active COIN ops ➤ Increased incidents - "Killed in Action" ➤ Countering complex attacks ➤ Loss of initiative - Holding secured areas	2009






DEU Approach for Force Adaption – Level of Ambition

DEU approach for Force Adaption

Specific Changes

- **Training**: High Intensity Warfighting capability enables all other mission types
 - 1. riflemen commanders; male female; just all!!
 - 2. team platoon company battalion/ TF brigade division
- Training: elementary and specific military training PLUS mission specific training (e.g. cultural)
- Personnel: mentoring, advising and partnering element in each headquarters (sustainable)
- Material: Protection and Maneuverability essential for missions, but armor and firepower for ensuring initiative and dominance in combat








Main Lessons Learned **Political Findings**

- Political endstate













Future Challenges for GER Army



Summary

- DEU adapted its forces according to the needs of missions abroad (structure, material, training)
- Missions abroad are <u>no</u> blueprint for national and alliance defense
- Ability to conduct high intensity combined and joint arms operations enables domination in all types of mission
- Fully equipped and trained forces with the ability to fight together with international partners are the key to persist all threats









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
